ANTARCTIC FIRE ANGELS COMPLETE THEIR EXTRAORDINARY EXPEDITION

Firefighters Rebecca Openshaw-Rowe from Mid and West Wales Fire and Rescue Service and Georgina Gilbert from South Wales Fire and Rescue Service have completed their extraordinary Antarctic expedition.

Rebecca and Georgina otherwise known as the Antarctic Fire Angels - embarked on their expedition at the beginning of November 2023 and reached their final destination on January 12th 2024. They have walked and skied over 1,200km in 52 days, from the coast of Antarctica to the South Pole - the equivalent of 29 marathons.

The Antarctic Fire Angels are the first people ever to complete their chosen route and their expedition was entirely unguided and unassisted, whilst pulling their own supply and equipment sleds - each weighing over 100kg. In addition to covering this incredible distance, they have had to endure the extreme conditions of the coldest place on Earth with temperatures reaching as low as -30°C and wind speeds of up to 60mph. Their expedition took over four years of careful planning and training, and one of the principal aims was to challenge gender stereotypes and to inspire future generations of women.

Rebecca and Georgina are fantastic role models for women and girls to pursue a career in whichever field they choose and have provided advice and support to women undergoing the firefighter recruitment process.

The Antarctic Fire Angels have also been raising important funds for **The Fire Fighters Charity** - which provides lifelong support for serving and retired members of the UK's fire and rescue services and their **JustGiving page** is still accepting donations.

IN SEARCH OF PERCE BLACKBOROW THE STOWAWAY WHO SAILED WITH SHACKLETON



On a recent visit to Newport to attend the opening of an art exhibition, I took the opportunity to pay homage to one of my favourite Antarctic explorers – the stowaway on Shackleton's Endurance adventure, Perce Blackborow.

For those unfamiliar with the story the young 19 year old managed to get aboard Shackleton's ship Endurance in Buenos Aires and eventually became a trusted member of the crew. The journey started as expected, except a stowaway was found three days out of port after leaving South America for Antarctica.

It was too late for Shackleton to turn back and so he offered the stowaway, 19 year old Perce Blackborow, a position of steward with the condition "If anyone has to be eaten, then you will be the first!".

Perce's granddaughter Rachel Clague

told me about her campaign to get some

sort of recognition for her grandfather

and she successfully managed to get a


memorial tree and plaque installed in

Belle Vue Park in 2022. I went along to the park and found the tree, a Southern

Beech, in a beautiful spot. It was a fitting

tribute to one of Newport's heroes.

The next day John Blackborow offered to take me to St Woolos cemetery to see his grandfather's grave.

We found the grave and it was a very emotional moment for me especially when I saw the photo of Perce with the carpenter's cat Mrs Chippy on his shoulder mounted on the back of the headstone.

ENDURANCE DELIVERED FROM UKRAINE WAR ZONE

A model ship of Sir Ernest Shackleton's famous ship, Endurance, has been handed to a museum in Cornwall, after it was rescued from the front line of Ukraine's war with Russia and brought back by a Plymouth businessman.

The scale replica was built by retired rocket engineer Vitaliy Vrubel, who was commissioned to build it by the Cornish Shipwreck Treasure Museum in Charlestown, near St Austell.



Andy Evangelou (left) and Maksym Litvinov delivered the ship to Lynne Raubenheimer at the museum after transporting it from Ukraine.

It became stuck in a 'hot zone' near the front line in Ukraine, after Russia's invasion and the recent destruction of a dam which flooded the Dnipro region in which Mr Vrubel lived.

While its maker was evacuated to Poland, the model itself was left in storage in

Dnipro, much to the dismay of the museum, which had plans to use it in an exhibition about the explorer's famous Antarctic expeditions.

However, it has now been retrieved and handed over thanks to an effort coordinated by Plymouth man Andreas Evangelou, who personally delivered the artefact together with Maksym Litvinov, a Ukrainian now living in Plymouth.

Mr Evangelou was taking tonnes of aid into Ukraine after a fundraiser backed by Plymouth veterinarian Edmund Shillabeer, who provided medicines and food for animals affected by flooding in Kherson, Ukraine.

Members and guests enjoyed a sparkling wine reception and mingling with our guest speaker prior to sitting down to an excellent three course dinner.


Guest speaker Michael Smith had previously presented on Tom Crean and Sir Ernest Shackleton and the committee wanted to go back to an earlier "hero".

We are pleased to announce John Bathgate is on the road to recovery and planning a return to the Amazon in 2024 to complete the Summit to Sea Expedition.


FUTURE EVENTS

CAPTAIN SCOTT'S BIRTHDAY TO BE CELEBRATED ABOARD THE PADDLE STEAMER WAVERLEY

PS Waverley is the last seagoing passenger-carrying paddle steamer in the world. Built in 1946, she sailed from Craigendoran on the Firth of Clyde to Arrochar on Loch Long until 1973. Bought by the Paddle Steamer Preservation Society (PSPS), she has been restored to her 1947 appearance and now operates passenger excursions around the British coast.

Since 2003, Waverley has been listed in the National Historic Fleet by National Historic Ships UK as "a vessel of pre-eminent national importance" The chairman invites you to join him



for a sailing adventure departing from Penarth Pier to sail along the north Somerset coast to Ilfracombe. Lunch will be taken in the Smugglers Inn famous

for its seafood. There are other pubs and restaurants to enjoy as well, just be sure to be back on board by 1600 hours for return trip.
